ALL THINGS DOGS

Warmer weather brings out fleas and ticks which can cause havoc with our dogs. These pests carry diseases so we always encourage people to use a flea/tick preventative, and to use it all year long. Warm days in the winter can also awaken these pests.





Ticks can transmit several diseases like Lyme Disease, Ehrlichiosis, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever and Canine Anaplasmosis. These diseases tend to have similar symptoms: fever, lethargy, swollen joints or lameness, loss of appetite, and depression. Check your dog when he comes inside to make sure ticks haven't found a ride on him. Symptoms often don't manifest until the disease is more advanced.

Fleas are mainly a nuisance, but they can also inflict some discomfort and disease. Fleas can cause Flea Allergy Dermatitis, which accounts for more than 50% of all dermatological cases reported to vets. The scratching can lead to infection. They also serve as a host for tapeworms which can infect your pet. It is also a fact that fleas can spread diseases to people, including typhus and plague. Fleas on cats can transmit "cat scratch fever" to people.





The best defense is to prevent fleas and ticks from infesting your dog in the first place. There are several preventatives on the market from collars to medications. You should talk to your vet for the best option for your pet. And your dog should be tested yearly for Lyme and other tick-borne diseases. Keeping your pet pest-free also helps keep your house pest-free, and that makes everyone more comfortable and happy.

ALL THINGS CATS

The Cat's Meow All cats make sounds — from meows and purrs to growls and hisses — but some felines are more vocal than others.

Kittens are typically more communicative than older cats, and domestic felines are usually more vocal than feral ones.

Cats communicate with meows, chirrups, hisses, purrs, chatters and growls, but the meow is the most common.

Meow Kittens will meow to their mothers, but as they mature, they typically quit using this sound to communicate with other cats. Often, adult domestic cats that meow do so only in the presence of humans. This is likely an extension of the way kittens use their plaintive meows as a signal.

If you have cats, you probably know that not all meows are equal. You might even be able to determine if your cat is happy, angry or demanding food or attention just by listening to the type of meow.



Purr It's often assumed that cats make this calming sound when they're happy, but they purr for many other reasons as well. Purring can signal that a cat feels frightened or threatened and research shows it's also a form of self-healing.

Chatter This stuttering sound has been described as a cross between a meow and a bleat. It's typically heard when a feline sees something — often a bird or flying insect — that they can't reach. It could communicate excitement or frustration.



Hiss A hiss can be loud or soft depending on the cat and the situation. It's often the feline response to fear and can be directed at cats or other animals, as well as humans. When a cat is hissing, it's best to give the animal some space.



Chirrup This trilling sound is a cross between a meow and a purr, and many cat owners say their felines use it as a form of greeting.





Growl These rumbling sounds are meant as a warning. They can be a response to humans, animals or other cats, and most felines make the noise out of fear, anger or territoriality. . Growling is often added if body language and hissing don't seem to be effective. It can be a more demonstrative sign that the cat is definitely not to be disturbed or hassled.

Caterwaul This shrill and wailing noise is the cry of a cat in heat. Once your female cat is spayed, you will never hear this noise coming from her.






Looking For Love




