## **ALL THINGS CATS**

A call came in to the Cat Hot Line. A man named William called for help with his cat colony. William had a colony of cats and he knew it would only grow if the cats were not fixed.



He called 5 other groups asking for help and they all said they were too busy to help him. He was desperate to trap these cats and get them fixed. But no group was willing to help him.

Then he saw the full-page ad IRHS had run in the paper, informing readers who we are and what we do. He called and left a message. Dorothy called him back, got some information on his location and situation and then emailed me. I told her I was currently working 4 colonies but I would call William and talk to him when I had time. She called William back, explained someone would call him.

A month later, I called William. I told him I was busy but I will get back to him and we will see about trapping his cats. He sounded eager for help and regretted I wasn't able to do anything yet. Every week, I texted William to let him know I had not forgotten him or

the cats. He appreciated those text messages.

I was finally able to get a hold of Gina and Joan (more volunteers of IRHS who do trapping) and told them of William's colony and it was agreed we would meet at William's place with traps and cages on Sunday.

Jon and I showed up a minute before Gina and Joan at the address. Met with William. We started setting up traps, getting cages ready and started to get to work. After about 5 hours, 14 cats were trapped including the house cat. He didn't know if the cat was fixed but it was real friendly towards the female cats so we took the cat with us.

Six females went to Tri County Animal Hospital and 7 males went to Jessica Beath clinic. One



kitten was too small to get a rabies shot so Jon and I put her in a dog cage so she can eat and gain some weight. One female had an underlying condition so did not survive after surgery. The 12 cats were recovering and were to go back to William on Saturday.

That Tuesday, I got a text from William. He said he trapped 2 cats with his dog crate and a string. I was impressed and told him I will stop by that night to pick them up. By the time I got to his place, he had 4 cats trapped. It was also raining steady

with strong winds. We managed to work together in the rain to get the cats into the transfer cages I brought and then into my vehicle. Those cats were fixed on Thursday.



Thursday night I got a text from William stating he caught two more cats. Using only the dog crate and a string. I texted Gina asking if she could get appointments at Tri County for two cats as Jessica Beath clinic isn't open on Friday. Two appointments were made, we delivered the cats to Tri County on Friday morning.

Saturday came, Joan met us at the shelter, we transferred the Tri County cats to us and Jon and I returned to William with a load of cats. The cats were happy to be home, William was pleased they were fixed. William told us there was one cat left. I left him a trap and wished him luck. On Sunday



he called, said he caught the last cat. I sent Jon to pick up

the cat. Monday, March 12<sup>th</sup> that cat was fixed.

In one week, 21 cats were trapped and all but the tiny kitten were fixed. The kitten is currently in foster care.

It was accomplished through teamwork between the volunteers of Indian Rivers Humane Society and the cat caretaker.



William's colony is now fixed, with rabies shots and back home. William is thankful and I thanked him for trapping 7 of the cats which made my work easier. On to the next colony...

### Meet Little Sister

Little Sister, along with Big Sister, was brought to our largest homeless cat colony with their mother about five years ago. Over the years, she led a pretty good life, sunning herself in the road and playing with the other members of the colony. She grew used to the people who fed her, but she never allowed herself to be touched by a human.



Last January one of the feeders at the colony noticed a shiny new chain in front of Little Sister's house. When she picked it up, she discovered to her horror that it was attached to a cat! Little Sister had stepped into an illegal leg trap. Although Little Sister was immediately rushed to a cat hospital, her leg could not be saved.

Losing a leg is not much easier when you have four than when you have two. While the surgery was completely successful, Little Sister was troubled by her lack of mobility and became largely inactive for several weeks. Today, however, she is becoming a reflection of her happier past. She is up and about, playing with toys and darting about the kitchen where she lives in her foster home. She is still wary about being touched by a human but seems content to allow her foster mom to scratch her ears while she is busy eating.



Little Sister needs to live with someone who can give her a safe place to live and who is happy to have another life in the house but who does not

need physical contact. Odds are, over time Little Sister will learn to appreciate a human touch.


This would be a great opportunity for a family with older children that could help with the temporary care and socialization of young kittens.

# 2018 Virginia Federation of Humane Societies Annual Conference

I attended the VFHS annual conference in Charlottesville in March. The conference is a great way to network with other animal welfare folks, learn best



practices, explore new ideas for adoptions and fund-raising, and come together to enhance our life-saving work. Some of the attendees included public and private shelters, rescue groups, animal control, veterinarians, and other animal advocates.

A variety of work shops were offered covering a wide range of animal welfare subjects. I attended workshops covering the removal of breed labels in shelters; fund-raising

planning; creating operating procedures; creating a positive culture; engaging the public; community cats; and animal advocacy. The presenters were fantastic, and there is a lot of great work being done in the animal welfare world.

Regarding the breed labels, many shelters have adopted the idea that all dogs are individuals. By calling them "American Shelter Dogs" or "Mixed Breed Dogs", the focus is on their personality rather than a perceived behavior associated with a particular breed.

Besides, just because a dog may "look"



like a breed or combination of certain breeds, does not mean he is. Most dog's DNA test will confirm, and even the test results often

return a percentage of "unknown".

Julie Castle of Best Friends Animal Society gave the key note address. Best Friends is leading the way and setting the standards to make America a No Kill Community by 2025. It takes everyone's participation and commitment to make this happen. IRHS is proud to be a network partner of Best Friends.

As a member of VFHS, we are eligible to



apply for grants through their Spay VA initiative. I am happy to report we were granted \$1,000 towards our TNR program. This money will cover the spay/neuter surgeries of 20-25 cats, which is about the average colony

size of those we have helped.

The conference is not only informative, but a lot of fun, too. I encourage other IRHS volunteers to attend future conferences. It is also open to anyone with an interest and commitment to animal welfare.

Our 4 Paws Thrift Store is going to be moving to 702 Main Street in West Point soon! Just a block down from our current location, we are excited to be in what we hope will be a better, brighter space for our friends and customers.
